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Message from Mr. Day

Hello Stonybrook Middle School Families!

This newsletter marks the transition from the end of our first quarter to the beginning of our second as well as the transition from summer weather to the fall. Just as we prepare for the upcoming changes in weather, we need to continually prepare for what lies ahead in our school year.

At this point in the school year, students have settled into their routines and have established relationships with peers and staff. As we reflect on how the first marking period has gone, we look to see in what areas we need to improve and help us prepare for what's next. The second grading period moves very quickly even though it is the same number of days as the first grading period. Between the two week intersession in October and Thanksgiving holiday in November, we will be at the doorstep of December before we know it.

So as you review your child's progress from the first nine weeks are you satisfied with how he/she has performed? Are you satisfied with how he/she is growing? Is the social and emotional development of your child on par with expectations that you have for your child? Middle school is a challenging developmental stage and at times can leave one scratching his/her head in bewilderment. But at the end of the day, middle school children are like all children and all of us – they need to know that they are safe, they are cared for, that they can take responsible risks in their growth – and know that they are still loved.

As I review the performances of SMS as a whole, there is much yet to be done. We have a number of students who are performing where we would like them to be but many more students who need a renewed dedication to their academic and social interaction performances. Through mutual collaboration, holding all students accountable for all of the performance areas, we can bolster student growth in both the academic and social/emotional areas of their development.

There are many academic resources available for students to use outside of the academic school day to strengthen their skills. In this newsletter I have provided a short list of resources that are directly related to what we are using at SMS. I strongly encourage parents and guardians to review this list, look at the information that we have provided from NWEA and ISTEP+ as well as what teachers are sharing from the classroom to help support academic growth.

With regards to the social and emotional development of our students, we are attending training in November that assists us in furthering our knowledge of working with students who have been exposed to various types of trauma and how it impacts them in various settings, including school. My assessment after this first grading period is that as a community of stakeholders we must find a better way to support the emotional well-being of our students which will in turn allow them to be prepared to engage in their higher order thinking skills that are required to receive and respond to critical thinking demands.

College and Career Readiness in Math


In Math it is critical that our students get prepared for Warren Central High School, but also more importantly they need to be prepared for College and career. Even if our students do not end up in a job that is highly focused on Math, our Math process standards will help students become problem solvers in the real world. Here are the 8 Math Process Standards that we focus on:

Process Standards for Mathematics

- 1. Make sense of problems and *persevere* in solving them.
- 2. *Reason* abstractly and quantitatively.
- 3. **Construct** viable arguments and **critique** the reasoning of others.
- 4. **Model** with mathematics.
- 5. Use appropriate tools strategically.
- 6. Attend to precision.
- 7. Look for and make use of structure.
- 8. Look for and express regularity in repeated reasoning.

What is going on in 8th Grade Math?

We just finished discussing different types of graphs and analyzing them to find real world information such as traveling using different types of transportation. Currently we are focusing on Linear Functions and how to discover linear functions in different representations such as tables, graphs, and equations, with a focus on slope-intercept form. We will then use that knowledge to make predictions of what will happen in the future if the patterns remain constant.



7th Grade Math:

Throughout this year your student will not only be learning traditional math concepts to ready them for Algebra and a college track, but will also be learning to critical thinking skills through individual work, small group, and partner work. We are using an online curriculum called Agile Mind. We are all VERY excited as we work to develop fantastic mathematical thinkers!

Current Learning Objectives: Over the month students will be working how to find rates of change in order to write rules for functions. They will also need to recognize the differences in the rates in given situations, in graphs, and in tables to be able to understand what the model is demonstrating for them.

Q: How can I support my student with Rate of Change?

A: Asking to see your student's notes and/or work from the day and asking them to verbalize what was investigated or discussed in class will support your student's thinking and growth. Dig deep when asking questions! Use the question "Why" a lot!

Q: How can I support the use of Rate of Change in everyday life?

A: Stock Market? Pitch of a roof? Skiing? The pitch of the roof can be very important in some climates for example: if you live in a snowy climate the steeper the pitch the better because you want the snow to run off the roof.

** Students have access to the online curriculum from home and may review the lesson that way. They can go to warren.agilemind.com. There is also video tutorials on Google Classroom (classroom.google.com).

Classroom Instruction Integrity

To ensure classroom instruction is not disrupted, we generally refrain from making any announcements during any class period that an item is in the office for a student. While we will attempt to manage deliveries throughout the day, it may not be feasible for us to get the item to your child in time for the intended class. Our advice to students is to plan thoroughly the evening before to ensure you are ready for the next day. We realize that on occasion we all forget something; however it should not be a pattern to expect a parent/guardian to be available to bring something in and in turn that we are able to get the item to its destination upon receipt. We do attempt to prioritize lunch delivery.

Car Riders – Student Drop Off and Pick Up Procedures

As our processes continue to be more efficient and as we monitor student safety each day, please note the following safety reminders for all students and your own children.

- Do not use your cell phones while actively within the pickup and drop off processes. Safety of all people is more important than any phone conversation one may be having.
- Have your child enter/exit from the CURB side only. Getting in/out on the driver's side puts your child at substantially greater risk.

Also, please note that the official drop off time at Door 5 is from 7:20A-7:27A. While we have been able to staff the start of this process earlier, this may change due to other needs in the building. At 7:27A, we turn our attention to students who are already in the building and ensuring they get to first period in a safe and orderly manner. If you arrive after this time, you will need to drop your child at Door 1.

PBIS


